Suttontown School was initially opened at the Methodist Church site on Suttontown Road in 1869. The school moved to it's current site in 1918 after outgrowing it's previous site. In 2019 Suttontown Primary School celebrates 150 years of education.

Located right on the northern boundary of Mount Gambier, Suttontown Primary school is now within the re-aligned city limits and is no longer the isolated rural district facility that was built in 1917. As the school of right for the former Tarpeena Primary School catchment area, we currently have 18 enrolments from this district, in addition to the growth in the north-west area of Mount Gambier.

The classroom learning spaces at Suttontown Primary School have been updated with new storage systems, active-panels and furnishings and furniture. Our classrooms are now modern, bright and welcoming spaces for students to work and learn. Banks of Ipads and Laptop computers are available to assist all students with their learning. A large screen and projector was installed in our gymnasium. This has meant that we are now able to show videos and photos during school assemblies and presentations.

Suttontown offers Japanese lessons through the Open Access Language Partnerships Program. Our Japanese teachers visit our students and teachers several times throughout the year. The final visit usually entails a very successful Japanese Cultural Day where students have the opportunity to experience Japanese food, craft and cultural activities.

Suttontown teachers have been using the Brightpath Assessment Tool for Writing since 2017. Most teachers have received professional development in the Seven Steps Writing program. All teachers appreciate the opportunity to moderate our student writing samples against an external continuum and to use the feedback and teaching points available in the tool..

Subject offerings:

Suttontown Primary School offers all areas of the Australian Curriculum.

We offer Japanese through the Language Partnerships Program with Open Access College. Our students look forward to the termly visits from our Japanese teachers.

Choir is offered to senior students

Special needs:

The school has staff trained in InitialLit, MiniLit, MacqLit, Too Smart and Quicksmart Numeracy.

Students experiencing difficulty in Literacy or Numeracy may be placed on a support program after consultation with their family.

Suttontown Primary School plans individual student programs for identified students with disabilities, complex learning needs, Aboriginal students and Students who are under the Guardianship of the Minister.

Teaching methodology:

Composite year levels for all classes. Focus on TfEL and Learning Design using Understanding by Design.

Giving students ownership over their own learning through the use of learning targets, success criteria and examples of quality work has been an ongoing focus of our school.
